












#### Yakama

Yakamas continuously strive to keep these life-way laws

We are the Natitayt (The People). We exercise our national sovereignty and preserve our cultural lifeways. We live in balance with the land as dictated by our traditional teachings. We acknowledge the wisdom of our elders and spiritual leaders. We are accountable to the Creator. As long as the earth shall last, there will be life. Our life is the land. We are the Cayuse, Umatilla and Walla Walla.



## Coeur d'Alene



hu, ku ch-n'ułkhw. The ancestral territory includes almost 5,000,000 acres of what is now north Idaho, eastern Washington and western Montana. Coeur d'Alene Indian villages were numerous and permanent, each village and the people there had a distinct name in the ancestral language. Collectively, members today call themselves, "Schitsu'umsh," meaning "Those Who Are Found Here."



The ladies in this picture are all very unique in their style of dress. They may have helped in the creation of their dresses'. With the skinning and tanning of the buckskin, to the beadwork to their dress and accessories. The wampum necklaces were usually passed down to young woman as part of their dowry. #### **Tribal Histories**

Historically, hide dresses were worn daily, many undecorated because they were "work" clothes, although some form of decoration might be added. More highly decorated hide dresses were made to be used in rite-of-passage ceremonies including important family or tribal gathering events.

Hide dresses were once decorated with natural colordyed porcupine quills and when beads were introduced circa early 1800s, they were much easier to use in curilinear designs and became plentiful as fur traders and settlers began moving westward and trades increased with them. Dresses still use shells, elk teeth, hide fringes, wampum bone beads, tiny bells or coins



#### **DESCRIPTION:**

Khwist Ha St(in "Antelope That Walked", baptized Aloysius Xwipep [current orthography as Khwipep], was known in English as Walking Antelope or Louis Antelope. Sometimes his name was spelled Hustah Stei or Hus-ta-stee. He was the brother of Chief Vincent Khwipep, the father of Morris Antelope Ats'qhu'le'khw "Looking At The Land", and the maternal grandfather of Lawrence Nicodemus. He was a great runner who admired the speed of the antelope so that he used that for his model, but since he could not run as fast as an antelope, his name became "Antelope That Walked". Somewhere in Montana he climbed over a wall to escape death by burning in a fort. The escapees looked back and saw the fire. He is named Whis-los-ta-in, Walking Antelope, in a photo in the archives of the Smithsonian institution.

# Microhistory - City Lights Bookstore, San Francisco

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# IMAGE METADATA

The purpose was to digitally document the cultural heritage of City Lights Bookstore to show the cultural and spatial relations between City Lights and Vesuvio Café.

Photographs in this collection have been produced by Heather Do, Connor Rowe, Kathleen Markham, Alison Lowrie, Kenneth Chiu, Katie Salmond, Diana Chavez, Elena Toffalori, Ashley Vink, Aimee O'Dea, Liz Dolinar, Allison Barden, Justine Khoury, Daniela Alaniz-Roux, and Justin Thach at the request of Michael Ashley for the UC Berkeley Anthropology 136e class, Spring 2011. The purpose was to digitally document the cultural heritage of City Lights Bookstore to show the cultural and spatial relations between City Lights and Vesuvio Café. The images were intentionally framed and shot to show the close connection of the two places. City Lights Bookstore (Latitude 37.79771, Longitude -122.40647) is located in the North Beach neighborhood of San Francisco at the Broadway and Columbus intersection. Lawrence Ferlinghetti and Peter Martin founded City Lights Books in 1953. They created the first all-paperback bookstore in the United States. Today, it is known as "one of the few truly independent bookstores in the United States" where people come to witness what is described as a "Literary Landmark (City Lights)." The bookstore was popular with the "beatnik" generation and the legacy of anti-authoritarian politics and insurgent thinking can still be felt today. While the area around the bookstore has changed, there continues to be a strong beatnik influence in the store as seen in the types of books offered. The store has expanded since opening in 1953, and now offers three floors of new-release hardcovers and paperbacks. In 2001, City Lights was dedicated as a historic landmark. Today, Ferlinghetti co-owns the store with Nancy Peters.

# TRADITIONAL KNOWLEDGE:

Percy A. Brigham was born August 12, 1910 at Hopewell, Oregon to John Henry and Mary Philomena Chalifoux Bringham. He passed away at the age of 91 in Cayuse, Oregon on September 21, 2001. He served with the U.S. Army in New Zealand, on Guadalcanal, and New Guinea during World War II. He had been a resident at Celiol, Cascade Locks, Arlington and then the Umatilla Indian Reservation the last 15 years of his life. His livelihood was fishing and hunting. He fished at Celilo Falls and was one of the first five who went back to the Columbia River to fish after the inundation of Celilo Falls. He was very knowledgeable about sturgeon fishing. Percy had an incredible knowledge of the Tribes' history and was always hungry to learn more. He shared his knowledge freely, and was a great source of information and inspiration to Tamastslikt Cultural Institute staff.

Treaty, Lands and Resources - 2013

The Musqueam Public Cultural Art Installations mapping project is intended to document and promote Musquearr's cultural presence in Vancouver. The main objective of this project is to map out the public cultural art installations created by Musqueom artists and or artists who have art installations that are a visual representation of Musqueam art and history. By mapping and sharing Musqueam's artistic and cultural presence in the Vancouver area, we are proudly celebrating our community's achievements and enhancing our vibrant Nation's place in the wider public sphere. This project is made possible with funding through the BC Creative Communities program.

The mapping process will include interviews with the artists, mapping of the locations and media curation of the installations. This project will focus on mapping Musqueam public art installations in five general regions or areas. These areas are: Musqueam Indian Reserve No 2, the USC Campus, the City of Richmond, the City of Vancouver, and municipalities just outside of Vancouver (Burnaby, North Vancouver, etc).

This project takes direction from Musqueure's community driven Comprehensive Sustainable Community. Development Plan (CSCDP) - to "take pride in our culture," "put a Musqueam Tace/brand" on everything we do (celebrate/capture pride)" and "support the language and culture of Musqueam people." In addition to those objectives outlined in the community plan, this project aligns with an action area identified in the plan to "Musqueamize" our Traditional Territory with art, signs, symbols, information and Musqueam names.

Currently there is no central source that showcases Musqueam cultural art installations. In callaboration and partnership with Mukurtu Content Management Systems (a library, archives and museum database being implemented within the Musqueam Archives), and the Fetzer Institute (a charitable organization) we will be able to display the art through an online map and web based exhibition site accessible through the Musqueam Website in February 2014. We, the Musqueam community will be able to tell our own stories, our way, with our own words.


