

Mukurtu CMS Sites Research Activity

Digital Stewardship Curriculum

This activity is an opportunity to research and discuss other websites that use the Mukurtu CMS platform. This activity can be done alone, but works best with a partner or in a small group to share your thoughts and findings.

Reflection, Discussion, or Presentation

If working on your own, choose a few websites and reflect on each using the suggested questions below.

If working with others, assemble a group and assign one or two website(s) to each person. Each person can visit the site, explore, and share their impressions. We suggest sharing in a short five minute presentation, if your group members are comfortable. Doing short presentations like this can increase ease and confidence in speaking about Mukurtu CMS sites and features.

Site Research Questions

The following questions may be helpful to consider as you explore other sites.

- Who created the site? Who maintains the site?
- What is the intention of the site?
- Who are the main audiences of the site?
- What are some things you liked about the site?
- What are some things you might do differently on your own Mukurtu CMS site?
- Was it easy to navigate the site?
- How did the creators use images, color, and other simple design elements on their site?
- Can you identify the Communities used on the site?
- Can you identify any publicly visible Cultural Protocols used on the site?
- What Categories and Keywords are used on the site?
- What other interesting Mukurtu CMS features are used on the site?
- Did looking at this website inspire you for your own project? List some of the inspirations, questions, and ideas you came away with.
